### 3. CanAsian International Dance Festival presents: MUSEUM DANCES Ancient Inspiration, Contemporary Interpretation

The theme of the Sixth Annual Asian Heritage Month Education Roundtable is "Asian-Canadian Collaboration in Education: Pathways of Enrichment". It will provide an overview of how Canadian schools and universities can carry out exchange programs with their counterparts in Asia, especially China. The presenters will also highlight specific exchange programs and networks that have proved to be successful. You will gain insights into how to develop these exchange programs, what are the possibilities, and how best to utilize them in ways that suit your school's resources and requirements.

The roundtable will be chaired by Professor Ruth Hayhoe, OISE, University of Toronto. The Asian Heritage Month Lecture and Keynote Speech will be given by Consul Fang Jun, Consul & Director for Education, Consulate General of the People's Republic of China in

Toronto, on the theme "Achievement and Challenges of International Education in China." Other speakers include Professor Qiang Zha from York University and Professor Michael Connelly from OISE, University of Toronto, who will show how ongoing exchange programs have fostered egalitarian and inclusive classrooms in Toronto. The discussants are: Professor Sheila Embleton, York University and President, Shastri Indo-Canadian Institute; and Dean Martin Singer, York University Faculty of Liberal Arts and Professional Studies.

Synopsis of Wayson Choy's talk: Reviewing his personal insights into his life as an in-between citizen, that is, his living as a hyphenated Chinese-Canadian for most of his life, Wayson Choy - born in Canada in 1939 - will explore how he now feels he has "become a Canadian." No more hyphens. He will expose the prejudices and racism that still prevents many of our citizens from feeling that they belong here as full-fledged citizens. The irony is that these prejudices and racist attitudes are found from both inside as well as from outside one's ethnicity and colour.

Orientik by Alvin Erasga Tolentino and Andrea Nann (The excerpt performed here will be different from that performed on May 28<sup>th</sup> at the Asian Heritage Month Gala Performance of Asian Artists): In a Canada-wide tour during the month of Asian Heritage, the contemporary Vancouver-based dance company Co. ERASGA will perform OrienTik/Portrait across Canada. Filipino Canadian choreographer and dancer, Alvin Tolentino creates this single signature work with a captivating sensitivity and Asian aesthetic of contemporary dance, Japanese drums (taiko) and classic music. In a series of dynamic portraits, OrienTik/Portrait celebrates the marriage of dance and music with an extraordinary ability to transport and explore the ordinary with the imaginary, the emotion and dreams.

**Description:** Henry Ho has been exploring the innovative art form of Tai Chi Calligraphy for

more than 15 years.

Tai Chi Chuan 太極拳is a martial art form that reflects the unique interpretation of the laws of nature in the Chinese culture; and shufa 書法(calligraphy) is a cultural practice that embodies literacy and artistic expression. Although Tai Chi Chuan and calligraphy have their own expressive elements, they possess the same underlying philosophy and set of principles. Tai Chi Calligraphy combines essences of both practices and transcends their limitations to become an innovative form that exercises the body, mind and soul. In his exploration of Tai Chi Calligraphy, Ho intents to inject new dimensions into both art-making and fitness practice. The exhibition will showcase Ho's calligraphy-based art works. A Tai Chi Calligraphy performance will also take place at the opening, with the improvisation of guqin 古琴 (Chinese ancient stringed instrument) music by Michael Keith.
